


April is Autism Acceptance Month

- 6. Students want to feel loved.
- 7. Share what we've learned from others.

- 9. Ask for help.
- 10. Laugh.

- Many individuals on the spectrum stay in school until the age of 21.






- An individual can memorize information quickly

- Invite speakers into the school building to talk about autism including professionals in the field
- Read literature
- Post and distribute resources to all community stakeholders
- Hold a day to wear YELLOW to raise autism awareness





CLASSROOM LEARNING IDEAS

- Read aloud texts and pieces of literature with characters who are identified as having Autism
- Decorate butterflies and write how to be a good friend to all
- Students create their own brochures about Autism awareness
- Students write letters to legislators regarding equality for all students
